The list of various associations we had till date is as follows:

- Student exchange program between College of Architecture & Environment Design: **California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo, California, U. S. A.** and BNCA striving to ensure that the students benefit thru cultural and academic interactions. Students spend 100 days in each others college. This program was initiated in 2000 and for 6 year our students went to Calpoly in their 7th semester and Calpoly students came to India in their spring semester.

- Joint M.Arch Course with **Germany:**
Dr. B.N.College of Architecture is starting an International course of "Masters in Architecture" in collaboration with Dessau Institute of Architecture of **Anhalt University - Bahaus School** and **Chur Institute of Architecture, Switzerland** .This master's course is a two-year course of which one year shall be conducted at BNCA and one year in Europe Dessau/ Chur . The course would have emphasizes on Urban Design and Urban Planning.
